# A Note from Nat

I can't believe we are past the midpoint of 2022. Although this year seems to be slipping away your NAEAC colleagues have been busy with planning online workshops, the training day for AECs and visits with AECs.

We've also been working on initiatives to communicate our commitment to the 3Rs and the good work being done across New Zealand RTT institutions to advance these. Over the past few months NAEAC subcommittees have been progressing a number of workstreams. One of these is focussing on how Mātauranga Māori can be



incorporated across the NAEAC portfolio of work including the CEC template and reporting. This will be discussed at one of the workshop sessions at the AEC training day in October. We have also been working with MPI colleagues to plan for a 2023 workshop to continue the discussion around Mātauranga Māori in relation to the use of animals in RTT that we started at a previous workshop. ANZCCART and NAWAC will be invited, and this will provide us with an opportunity to share and develop our thinking with our colleagues in Australia and New Zealand. We are also planning for our big code of ethical conduct review/approval session in September which we hope will (COVID situation willing) be our first kanohi ki te kanohi hui since the start of the year. Finally, I am delighted that despite only being able to be virtually present, I was able, on behalf of NAEAC to thank our AEC colleague, David Peart, for his very long and committed service to supporting the development process and practice in relation to the ethics of animal use in RTT in New Zealand. Ka Pai David and thank you for your 40 years of work in this important space.

# Professor Laura Bennet

Laura is head of the Department of Physiology and co-director of the Fetal Physiology and Neuroscience Group in the Department of Physiology at the

University of Auckland. Laura is a research scientist in the areas of perinatal physiology with a specialist interest in preterm foetuses and newborns. Her research focuses on understanding how adverse events like oxygen deprivation and infection cause injury and illness, and the development of



treatment strategies. She is the current deputy chair of the animal ethics committee at the university and has served on the Australia and New Zealand Council for the Care of Animals and Research and Teaching (ANZCCART).

Laura and her family live in rural Clevedon, south of Auckland, on a couple of acres they have transformed from farmland back to bush. They share their lives with 3 crazy rescue cats (a brother and 2 sisters who are now one and half years old), a wonderful stray bush cat, and Pepper, the nextdoor neighbour's Labrador who comes to help the cats with their food. While the animals rule the house, the humans are content to sit out on their deck with great views and enjoy a good Clevedon wine or two.

#### **NAEAC AEC Service Award**

NAEAC would like to recognise the outstanding contribution of David

In 1982 David became the President of Waikato Federated Farmers and the new appointee on the Ruakura Animal Ethics Committee chaired by Dr Ron Kilgour. Since this time David has continued to serve on the committee at the request of the



various Chairs over the years due to his wealth of knowledge ranging from farming to research as well as a strong grasp of ethical issues. Over the years he has seen huge changes in the animal ethics landscape in New Zealand and changes in public acceptability of research practices. David continues to provide a perspective that is totally unique due to this vast experience and his ability to apply that knowledge. This has been invaluable to his ethics committee colleagues as they consider factors impacting and influencing manipulations.



# Sharing of tissues for use in RTT

MPI and NAEAC recognise that some experimental work requires the use of animal tissues. However, instead of breeding animals to be euthanised so their tissues can be used MPI and NAEAC encourage appropriate sharing of animal tissues. These would come from animals that had been used for another purpose under an animal ethics approval. If tissues are available, researchers should seek out opportunities to share them between laboratory groups. This will reduce the number of animals that need to be bred for use of their tissues.
